The All-Vehicle Sadie Strong Poker Run is scheduled for Sep. 9th as well, starting at 10:00 a.m. from the Ashland Optimist building, sponsored by the Good Vibrationz Ladies Charitable Riding Group. This is to support Sadie Robinette as she resumes treatment for her third bout with leukemia. Please support Sadie and the family however you feel drawn to.

The Ashland Optimists held Bingo on Fri. Aug. 18, with 114 players and plenty of help. The kitchen was able to deposit over \$700, thanks to Les Hahn, and all of the people who brought in extra desserts and helped out. .

We had a small group this morning, with Barrett Glascock leading the meeting after a delicious breakfast of two kinds of hash, ham slices, and an abundance of fresh fruit by Bern Bonderer. John and Ben Travlos. Barrett shared about the ceremony for the ARPA (American Rescue Plan Act) winners here in Ashland, which include the Southern Boone School District and us. He also mentioned a request he had received from the Hartsburg American Legion Auxiliary to provide financial assistance for their program providing flags to the Southern Boone Schools. Barrett will share this request at the next Optimist Board meeting on Sep. 14th.

Our speaker this morning was Lee Conner, Plant Protection Specialist (Plant Industries) for Area 8, which includes fifteen counties in our area, and State Apiarist (beekeeper). He has been with the Missouri Department of Agriculture since 2014. He also is the Boys & Girls Wrestling coach for Southern Boone High School, since 2017. Most of his work involves yearly inspections for all licensed nursery growers in Missouri, including facilities that are sending any products, including timber, to over seventy countries around the World.

As State Apiarist, he inspects incoming hives from other states, as well as providing a certificate of health for hives going from Missouri to other states that require certification. Lee brought in his protective suit, smoker, his hive tool, and examples of hives. He spoke about how to start a hive and how to keep a hive happy and healthy. Lee talked about the different bees in the hive and their separate roles. A gueen can live for years, but most drones and worker bees only live about six weeks and no drones are allowed to survive the Winter in the hive to save needed food.

Lee talked about why bees swarm when they feel they don't have enough room left in the hive, so the queen and half of the other bees leave the hive, but he also offered solutions to keep the bees happy in their hive. by pulling a nucleus of five frames to start a new hive, which will provide space in the old hive. Lee also spoke about treating hives for varroa mites with formic acid and other issues that can affect hives.

When Lee was finished sharing his abundant knowledge and answering questions, he drew for the Attendance drawing. Jan Palmer, Bryan Chapman, and Traci Howard had their chance at riches, but with their absence, the pot will continue to grow.
